

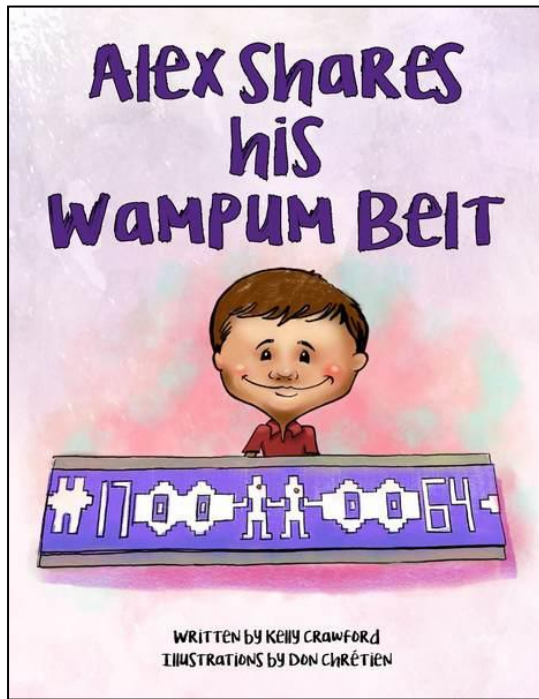



 <p>Pedagogical Considerations for Treaty Education</p> <p>Treaties Recognition Week Treaties Recognition Week was introduced to recognize and understand the importance of treaty education and to help everyone in Ontario learn about treaty.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Treaties are legal agreements made between two or more Nations. • Treaty-making preceded North American settlement. • Treaty outlines the terms, relationship and conditions of settlement in Indigenous Territories. • Both Settler and Indigenous Nations have a responsibility for knowing and upholding the Treaty obligations. <p>United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples recognizes, "the urgent need to respect and promote the rights of Indigenous peoples affirmed in treaties, agreements and other constructive arrangements with States"</p> <p>Why Treaty Education is important: The Importance of Treaty Education A letter to teachers on treaty education Ontario Students Talk About Why Treaties Are Important</p> <p>Educator As Learner As educators we need to reflect on our own history and privileges in relation to treaty education. Prior to engaging in this learning with your class, it is imperative that you inform your own personal and professional practice by building an understanding of the historical relationships between Indigenous Nations, the Crown and Canada.
